
☆ BHRW's November Membership Meeting

Susan Weidkamp is our new, 2021 1st Vice President. She is the oldest child of Kathie and Ken Wei-



dkamp. Susan and her three siblings grew up in Beaverton and all graduated from Sunset High. She attended Cottey College, a two-year women's liberal art college in Nevada, Missouri

where she played volleyball and basketball both years. Upon graduation she returned home to help raise her youngest brother while her mom went back to work at



Metropolitan Family Services as a nursing consultant. Working part time as a WSI/Lifeguard at Tualatin

Hills, she finished her bachelor of science degree in Psychology and later completed the masters course work necessary to achieve a standard teaching certificate, with endorsements in chemistry, physics and biology at PSU. After student teaching at Hilhi, she was offered a job at Glencoe High to teach chemistry, physical science and biology in the fall of 1983.

Susan was excited to live in the agricultural and fastgrowing tech community of Hillsboro. Already active as a Sunday school teacher, she soon was leading the guitar mass, singing in the choir and assisting the Diocesan Missioner with the Spanish speaking service by playing guitar. Through her efforts in Hispanic ministry and Cursillo, a renewal experience in the Episcopal Church, she made three outreach trips to Mexico City. Susan enjoyed 10 years volunteering in Hispanic ministry. She volunteered around 6 years as a leader in Hillsboro Young Life and helped start a

small church in her living room which is now the Chapel Downtown located in the Weil arcade. In 2010 she joined a summer 3-week mission trip to Tanzania.



Highlights of her 35-year career include building balsa wood bridges to teach physics concepts, teaching students to perform point mutations by inserting glow in the dark genes into bacteria, and teaching Chemistry in the Community where her Dad's background as an employee of Pacific Power and Light Company came in handy when students held Town Hall meetings to learn how hydroelectric dams could cause fish to die. From her early days at Cottey, Susan wove music into the classroom and twice per-



formed original compositions in front of the student body as a rap artist. Creating demos that ranged from

catching her hands-on fire to freezing hot dog "fingers" in liquid nitrogen, from breaking boards with her bare hands to laser lightshows she and her colleagues performed a variety of science related skits, and demos for the annual Science Demo Day held before Christmas break. Her passion for teaching biology, accelerated chemistry and bio-chem was recognized in 1998 when she was selected to be Oregon Science Teacher of the Year. In 2000 she began a

two-year summer research program through the Murdock Charitable Trust Partner in Science program in neuroscience research at the Oregon Regional Primate Center, now a part of OHSU. She has served on the

teacher advisory committee at OHSU and continues to be an adult sponsor at the Beaverton Hillsboro Science Expo and local NWSE.



Retiring in 2018 Susan continued to substitute teach in the district up until March 12, 2020 when the Governor began requiring the distance learning model. She continues to mentor students in science competitions and research projects. This fall she began assisting her nephew in his online community training pro-





gram. She has two zoom bombing kitties: Teacup the tabby and Mikko the Flame Point Siamese. Susan enjoys art pro-

jects, fixing things, and singing with Safe Haven, a local music group.

Susan, who is also known as "Aunt Soup" nicknamed by her 13-month old niece, now a senior at U of O, is excited to be part of the Beaverton Hillsboro Republican Women. She is looking forward to the Red Shoe Book Club, and serving BHRW members.
